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Thirteen Ordained to Priesthood Dunlap, Martin, Muenks, Nord Are Priests for St. Louis

On Saturday, May 27, 2006, Archbishop Raymond Burke ordained to the Order of Priesthood four Kenrick-Glennon seminarians for the Archdiocese of St. Louis: Rev. Christopher Dunlap, Rev. Christopher Martin, Rev. Nicholas Muenks, and Rev. Aaron Nord.

In attendance at the standing-room only Cathedral Basilica were family and friends of the four men, as well as priests, deacons, and men and women religious of the Archdiocese of St. Louis. Seminarians were also in atten-

Many seminarians commented that seeing their brother seminarians ordained to the priesthood was an inspiring experience that they hope to know in the years to come.

Last year, Father Gerald Blessing was ordained to the priesthood for the Archdiocese of St. Louis. Next year, God-willing, the new transitional deacons will be ordained to the priesthood, including four more for the Archdiocese of St. Louis.

Summer Offers Varied Ministries for Seminarians

Many of the bishops who choose to send their men to Kenrick-Glennon Seminary have developed summer priestly formation programs to continue to shape their men for service as priests in the particular circumstances of their dioceses. In the past, the men from St. Louis found work for themselves once the academic year came to a close. Many times, but not always, they lived in a parish rectory and did a variety of work, both ministerial

and manual labor.

The one exception to this for the men from St. Louis was the common experience of PFP (Priestly Formation Program) that was developed in the mid-1960's by Fr. Bill Lyons, a priest of the Archdiocese of St. Louis, and Fr. Frank Gaydos, C.M., and continued for several decades. It began as a six-week intensive spiritual program with the high point being a seven-day silent retreat conducted by Fr. Frank Cleary, S.J. The circumstances of priestly life today

“The most rewarding aspects of my priesthood involve working with people in the various parishes in which I’ve served. Just being a part of the lives of these special people, serving as God’s instrument in their lives, means so much to me. When God is working through you to bring His grace into their lives, you feel the reward of the priestly life. You are able to serve your parishioners at such important moments in their lives. The sacraments are remarkably rewarding experiences. When I am with someone during the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, I can feel the working of the Spirit—that sacred moment is an immensely grace-filled experience.”



(Summer Ministry, cont. from pg. 1) indicate the importance of ongoing formation and so Archbishop Burke has asked the Seminary Formation members to develop programs for the men from St. Louis who are entering Theology I, Theology II, and Theology III. Those entering Theology IV are ordinarily ordained deacons and are assigned to parishes as in the past.

Working closely with Fr. Michael Butler, the Archdiocesan Vocations Director, the men in Theology I and Theology II assist him in the preparation and execution of several vocation camps, including Kenrick-Glennon Days for Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth Graders and that is

closely followed by two High School Retreats—Christ Power I and Christ Power II. At the conclusion of those camps the men entering Theology III will travel to Mexico City to study the history, culture, and (Spanish) language of the many immigrants who are in our Archdiocese from Mexico. The men entering Theology II are participating in a ten-week residential spiritual formation program conducted by the Institute for Priestly Formation at Creighton University.

Those in Theology I will be assigned by Archbishop Burke to a parish and will participate in an orientation to the History and Heritage, Institutions and Agencies of the Archdiocese of St. Louis. They will visit the

shrines of St. Ferdinand, St. Rose Philippine Duchesne, the Miraculous Medal, and St. Joseph. They will learn of the influence of the Vincentians, Daughters of Charity, and St. Vincent de Paul Society. They will spend the day at St. John's Mercy Hospital and Cardinal Glennon Hospital, visit the retired priests at Regina Cleri, learn Archdiocesan history from Fr. Barnaby Faherty, S.J., and spend the day at St. Patrick's Center. Among many other activities, they will work with the Missionaries of Charity, tour Calvary cemetery, visit the Old and New Cathedrals, as well as listen to presentations from the various offices and agencies that comprise the Rigali Center.

Seminarian Spotlight



Kenrick-Glennon seminarians speak with many young people about their vocations to the priesthood and religious life. Here is the advice the following seminarians give to grade school and high school students who feel they might have a similar calling:

Craig Holway, Theology I / Archdiocese of St. Louis, Iowa / Home Parish: St. Ferdinand Parish, Florissant



“I recommend to these young people that they talk to priests about what it is to be a priest. It’s not just about celebrating the sacraments, although that’s a large part of it. Talk to priests about the other kinds of ministry they do: like hospital and nursing home visits, counseling, education, and parish administration. Finding out all aspects of the priestly vocation will allow you to pray over the whole picture. Also, talk to your family and friends. Oftentimes they can give you the encouragement you need to remain dedicated to your vocation discernment when the going gets tough.”

Noah Waldman, Theology III / Archdiocese of St. Louis / Home Parish: The Cathedral Basilica, St. Louis

“If you feel that God is calling you to the priesthood or to religious life, then rejoice because He probably is. Do not worry about whether the call is real—worry of that sort is useless and goes nowhere. Instead, listen to what God told all the prophets of the Old Testament: ‘Go, for I promise I will be with you!’ Have courage, and do not be afraid. Talk to a priest or to a religious. Dial up the vocations director. You are never too young or too old, too poor or too unworthy, to respond to God’s call.”



Bo Purcell, Senior, Cardinal Glennon College / Archdiocese of St. Louis / Home Parish: St. Gabriel the Archangel, St. Louis



“I recommend that any young man who is interested in following a calling to the priesthood speak with his parish priest or a priest with whom he is comfortable. A priest will be able to answer all of his questions and tell him about his own experiences in the seminary. Make an effort to attend Mass during the week, and really focus on the Sacrifice occurring there. Finally, go to adore the Blessed Sacrament whenever you can. In my own discernment, quiet prayer in adoration was essential to my discernment of God’s will in my life.”

John Straatmann, Senior, Cardinal Glennon College / Archdiocese of St. Louis / Home Parish: St. Francis Borgia, Washington

“I would suggest to every young man interested in the priesthood to get involved in his parish community. I received a lot of my encouragement from my parish priests and the parishioners at St. Francis Borgia. It doesn’t take much to get involved either. A young man can serve Mass, help with different social organizations and ministries within the parish, and much more! It’s important learn about parish life early on so that, as a priest, he may be an effective pastoral leader.”

Kenrick-Glennon Seminary Bids Farewell to Fr. John Heil

After serving Kenrick-Glennon Seminary for twenty-seven years, Fr. John Paul Heil has recently been appointed as Professor of New Testament in the School of Theology and Religious Studies at The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. Next semester Fr. Heil will be teaching a course on New Testament Introduction to thirty undergraduate students and a seminar on the Letter to the Ephesians to doctoral students.

Fr. Heil began teaching at Kenrick Seminary in 1979, when it was housed in what is now the Cardinal Rigali Center. He served as Academic Dean from 1983-86.

During his twenty-seven years at the seminary, Fr. Heil has taught courses on Biblical Hebrew, Biblical Greek, Introduction to the Old Testament, Prophets, Intertestamental Literature, Synoptic Gospels, Pauline Literature, Johannine Literature, Letter to the Hebrews, Catholic Epistles, and Book of Revelation.

With regard to education, Fr. Heil attended St. Louis Preparatory Seminary South (1962-66), Cardinal Glennon College (1966-70), and

Kenrick Seminary (1970-74). After ordination to the priesthood for the Archdiocese of St. Louis in 1974, he attended the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome (1974-79), earning the Doctorate in Sacred Scripture (SSD) degree.

Special memories for Fr. Heil include participating in the development of seminary education and formation for the past twenty-seven years, assisting in a three-month program of New Testament studies at the house of the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Jerusalem in 1981, leading groups of seminarians and others on study tours to Israel (2000) and Turkey (2002), sabbatical and summer trips to Greece, Syria, Lebanon, Jordan, Sicily, Tunisia, Malta, Cyprus, and Crete, and being part of the recent developments in teaching with technology in which Kenrick-Glennon Seminary is at the cutting edge among schools of theology.

Fr. Heil will depart with pleasant thoughts of being privileged to teach seminarians who are now serving as priests not only in the Archdiocese of St. Louis but

throughout the country and beyond. “The significant contributions of Fr. Jack Heil to the formation of priests over the past twenty-seven
