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## The Fourteenth Annual Peter Richard Kenrick Lecture "The Council of Chalcedon and Some Contemporary Christological Issues"

On March 19, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, Kenrick-Glennon Seminary hosted the fourteenth annual Peter Richard Kenrick Lecture, with Fr. Thomas Weinandy, OFM, Cap. as the presenter.

Fr. Weinandy has held a number of academic positions at major universities, most notably as Tutor and Lecturer in History and Doctrine for the Faculty of Theology at Oxford University from 1991 to 2004. He currently serves as the Executive Director of the Secretariat for Doctrine and Pastoral Practices of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Fr. Weinandy's lecture, "The Council of Chalcedon and Some Contemporary Christological Issues," addressed contemporary questions in light of the Council. While the presentation provided many deep insights regarding the natures of Christ, Fr. Weinandy's light and personable manner of speaking made the topic accessible to all present. The time for questions after the presentation also proved helpful in better understanding the Christology of Chalcedon; seminarians, faculty, and members from local Christian denominations asked Fr. Weinandy to expound upon topics mentioned in his talk.


## March for Life Inspires First Year Theologian

On January 22, a record 300,000 people gathered in our nation's capital to protest the 36<sup>th</sup> anniversary of legalized abortion in our country. Seminarians from Kenrick-Glennon were among the thousands who made the trip to Washington to march against the "Culture of Death."

This was my fourth trip to the March for Life. If you have never been to the March, or prayed outside an abortion clinic, it is difficult to convey the magnitude of this witness. I think I speak for all the seminarians here in

## Faculty Profile and Fond Farewell: Rev. Lawrence C. Brennan



For twenty-two years Kenrick-Glennon Seminary has been blessed by the service of Rev. Lawrence C. Brennan. Since 1987, Fr. Brennan has served the seminary as Professor of Systematic Theology and (beginning in 1989) as the seminary's Academic Dean. Last summer, with the agreement of then-Archbishop of St. Louis Raymond L. Burke, Fr. Brennan was released to the Diocese of Colorado Springs, pending completion of his duties this year at the seminary.

At the invitation of Bishop Michael Sheridan, Fr. Brennan will serve Colorado Springs in a threefold capacity, as Theological Consultant, as Director of Continuing Formation for Priests and Deacons, and as Director of Initial Formation for the Permanent Diaconate. Following a sabbatical in Rome this fall, where he will study at the Institute of Continuing Theological Education at the North American Col-

lege, Fr. Brennan will assume his new responsibilities in January 2010. He will be in residence at St. Peter Parish, in Monument, Colorado, about 20 minutes north of the city.

His new appointment has Fr. Brennan very excited for a number of reasons. "This assignment meshes well with my training and experience in the area of initial formation," said Fr. Brennan. "For many years at Kenrick-Glennon I have worked with the four pillars of formation as laid out by John Paul II in his 1992 apostolic exhortation, *Pastores dabo vobis*—human, spiritual, intellectual, and pastoral formation—and in my new assignment I will be working with the same four pillars, but now in the area of continuing formation."

Points of pride for Fr. Brennan in his role as the seminary's Academic Dean include: restructuring the curriculum into a more coherent whole; instituting a joint degree program in which graduates receive both a Master of Di-

vinity and a Master of Arts degree; working closely with Msgr. Timothy Cronin, Rector of Cardinal Glennon College, in overseeing the program design, faculty search, and accreditation of the new on-campus undergraduate program in philosophy, which graduates its first students in May 2009; and supporting instructional technology advances that, according to many institutional peers, make Kenrick-Glennon Seminary the premier Catholic seminary in the realm of technology-supported education.

Reflecting on thirty years of combined service at Kenrick-Glennon and at three previous appointments, Fr. Brennan quoted lyrics to the song "If I Were a Rich Man" from the musical *Fiddler on the Roof*:

If I were rich, I'd have the time that I lack / To sit in the synagogue and pray. / And maybe have a seat by the Eastern wall. / And I'd discuss the holy

## Faculty News and Notes



**Dr. Sebastian Mahfood**, Associate Professor of Intercultural Studies, participated in the Bataan Memorial Death March scheduled on

March 29 in White Sands, New Mexico. In honor of the special group of WWII heroes captured by the Japanese on April 9, 1942, and forced to march through the jungles of the Philippines where thousands died, Dr. Mahfood raced across the desert terrain with a 35-lb backpack. This was his 19th marathon since December, 2005.



**Fr. Thomas McDermott, O.P.**, Assistant Professor of Spiritual Theology, wrote the main article in the February issue of *Liguorian* magazine

entitled, "Catherine of Siena: Lenten Guide." The article is now available on the magazine's website.



**Dr. John Gresham**, Associate Professor of Systematic Theology, spoke on *St. Paul's Trinitarian Spirituality* for the Pauline Lecture Series at

Pauline Books and Media on February 11. This semester, he has been giving a series of talks on the *Trinity in the Letters of St. Paul* to the Poor Clare nuns at the Monastery of St. Clare. Dr. Gresham also continues teaching a year long course on the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* for the novices and postulants of the Carmelites of the Divine Heart of Jesus in Kirkwood. On March 4, he

was interviewed about his journey into the Catholic Church by Gus Lloyd on the *Seize the Day* morning radio show on *The Catholic Channel*, broadcast nationwide on Sirius Radio. Dr. Gresham wrote an article which will appear in *Liguorian* magazine this summer: "The Relevance of Religion in an Age of Science, Skepticism and Do-it-yourself Spirituality."



**Fr. Jack Hunthausen, S.J.**, Spiritual Director, gave a presentation on the Passion of Christ to a group of the Bridges Program on March 25. Bridges is a program

whereby people make the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius over a nine-month period instead of in the traditional 30-day time frame.



**Dr. Daniel G. Van Slyke**, Associate Professor of Church History, Dr. Daniel G. Van Slyke's study titled "*Despicere mundum et terrena: A Spiritual and Liturgical Motif in the*

*Missale Romanum*" was presented at the annual meeting of the Society for Catholic Liturgy in late January 2009. Also in January, Dr. Van Slyke addressed the permanent deacon candidates of Tulsa, Oklahoma, on "Liturgical Theology." In May, he will deliver a paper on "Sts. Marcellinus and Peter: Was Peter an Exorcist?" at the annual meeting of the North American Patristics Society. Dr. Van Slyke is putting the finishing touches on an entry addressing "*De unico baptismo contra Petilianum*," to be published in *The Oxford Guide to the Historical Reception of Augustine*.



**Dr. Andrew J. Sopko**, Director of the Souvay Library, was recently elected as chair of the Academic/Archives Library Services section of the Greater St. Louis

Chapter of the Catholic Library Association. He also currently serves as a member of the local host committee which is preparing for the annual conference of the American Theological Library Association to be held in St. Louis in June. An interview with Dr. Sopko in that capacity appeared in the March issue of the *ATLA Newsletter*.



**Dr. John P. Doyle**, Distinguished Professor of Philosophy, Kenrick-Glennon Seminary and Professor Emeritus of Philosophy, St. Louis University, recently had

an article published in the *Studia Neoaristotelica*. The article is entitled "A Treatise of Master Hervaeus Natalis, The Doctor Perspicacissimus, On Second Intentions."

# Seminarian Spotlight

As part of their education and formation, the seminarians of Kenrick-Glennon are required to read a substantial number of books, articles, and essays throughout the academic year. In addition to their assigned reading many seminarians still make time for personal, non-required reading. *The Herald* asked the question: “What non-required book are you currently reading and why would you recommend it?” Here is what these seminarians had to say:

**Henry K. Purcell, Theology II / Archdiocese of St. Louis / Home Parish: St. Gabriel the Archangel, St. Louis**



“Currently I am reading Mark Twain’s *Joan of Arc*, which he wrote after twelve years of studying her life. He tells her story through the eyes of a companion of hers and thereby makes all the characters come to life as the narrator. The narrative definitely highlights the excitement and different tensions throughout her life. Twain is quoted, ‘I like *Joan of Arc* best of all my books; and it is the best....’ I recommend this book both for the fascinating story of Joan of Arc as well as the engaging presentation given by Mark Twain.”

“I have been reading *Truth and Tolerance* by Pope Benedict XVI. In this book, Pope Benedict asks, ‘Can truth be recognized? What meaning does belief have? What positive meaning does religion have, if not connected with truth?’ He answers these from his perspective and the perspective of history, and shows how secular society so often opposes truth. This is a great book for anyone who is trying to articulate the truth, and understand those who do not believe in truth, oppose the truth, and ask ‘What is Truth?’”

“The non-class related book I am currently reading is *The Sum of All Fears* by Tom Clancy. Some of the books that students have to read for classes are not very engaging. Tom Clancy is a fresh reminder that books need not be burdensome. To be able to sit down with an engaging book and be able to have your own life wrapped up in the life of another character is both an exercise in leisure and an exercise in humility.”

“A book that I’m reading right now and a book that’s been popular among the Pre-Theology class this year is Jacques Philippe’s book, *Interior Freedom*. It is a short but excellent book that explains that true interior freedom is achieved by practicing the virtues of faith, hope, and charity. Although this book can be read quickly, it is best read slowly so as to digest and apply Jacques Philippe’s many great insights. I would recommend this book for all those seeking true freedom in this valley of tears.”

books with the learned men, / Several hours every day. / That would be the sweetest thing of all.

“I have a great love of theology,” remarked Fr. Brennan. “I may not sit in a synagogue, but I have the opportunity to discuss the holy books with learned colleagues and with very open students several hours every day—and that is a tremendous wealth.”

Concerning his students, he said: “I have always been excited to be a part of the Church’s future through my students, and I have found a non-stop source of personal inspiration in them. In the traditional expression I experience them as the *spes gregis*—as ‘hope of the flock’—because they have been my hope too.” Not to be too serious, he added with a grin, “And I taught them how to play the card game *Mille Bornes*—the second most popular game in France.”

Fr. Brennan spoke appreciatively of his faculty peers. “One of the pleasures of working at Kenrick-Glennon is that the faculty is such a harmonious group, a group unified in its vision of the Church, the priesthood, and the challenge of evangelization. Through our faculty days of recollection, our faculty

in-service days, and our occasional faculty retreats, I’ve experienced a dedicated and mutually supportive group of men and women. They have provided me an enriched environment in which to work, and I am proud of what we have achieved together.

“I am already beginning to feel a sadness about leaving. The seminary apostolate is very dynamic, very future-oriented. John Paul II called the seminary the ‘heart of the Church,’ and it has been a privilege for me to be a part of it for so many years. I will miss the people and the place, above all the intensity of this work. But I leave here with a strong sense of satisfaction.

“Even before I heard from Bishop Sheridan, I was beginning to sense that it might be time for me to move into a new apostolate. The Bishop’s call came to me then as a sign of Providence and I feel a sense of reassurance about taking the next steps. My previous appointment was in Colorado, and I have visited there every summer since. I know the parish where I will be staying, I have a lot of friends there, and they are excited about welcoming me. I have much to look forward to.”

Speaking on behalf of the Kenrick-Glennon Seminary community, President-Rector Msgr. Ted Wojcicki remarked: “The term ‘Renaissance Man’ is truly coined for Fr. Larry Brennan; for he is: theologian, linguist, chef, harpist, writer, teacher, dean, administrator, singer, not to mention an engaging wit and clever satirist.

Above all he is a priest of Jesus Christ who generously places all his bountiful gifts at the service of the Roman Catholic Church he loves. For those of us who are blessed to know and love him personally, he is also son and brother and uncle and cousin and colleague—and loyal friend; he will be missed greatly by our seminary community.”

It has always been inspiring to reach the top of Capitol Hill and look back down Constitution Avenue to see thousands more people marching behind you for blocks and blocks.

As Bishop Robert Hermann told us in his homily at Mass prior to the March, “[Jesus] brought you here. He wants to use you as a witness. And there’s plenty to witness to. We have only one life to live and Jesus is it. So this is our privilege to witness today and every day.” Bishop Hermann led the group of Kenrick-Glennon seminarians during the March, and several other St. Louis priests were alongside as well.

One of the most powerful moments of the trip was participating in the Mass held at the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception on the eve of the March. Seeing hundreds of

seminarians, deacons, priests and bishops gathered with an overflow crowd of the faithful to pray at Mass for an end to abortion is something I wish all Catholics could experience first-hand. There is a great feeling of hope in that place, and a knowledge that Christ can conquer this “Culture of Death” despite Satan’s presence in today’s culture. This is a clear call to live out our Catholic identity, and to convince many who don’t have a clue that they’re being deceived by Satan to choose Christ and to “Choose Life.”

As Bishop Hermann encouraged us, “We need to pray for those who are pro-abortion; we want them to be on Christ’s side; we want their salvation.”

All of us here at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary are thankful for the opportunity to be the witnesses for life that Christ is calling us to be, and to do it all for Him and for the sake of the Kingdom of God.
