On Saturday, May 28, 2005, Archbishop Raymond Burke ordained to the Order of Priesthood Father Gerald Blessing in a joyous ceremony at the St. Louis Cathedral Basilica.

In attendance were family and friends of Father Blessing, as well as priests, deacons, and men and women religious of the Archdiocese of St. Louis. Seminarians were also in attendance at the ceremony.

Many seminarians com-

mented that the most moving part of the Ordination Rite was the Laying on of Hands by the Archbishop and other priests who were present.

Last year, Father Tim Henderson was ordained to the priesthood. Next year, God-willing, four transitional deacons will be ordained to the priesthood. They include Deacons Christopher Dunlap, Christopher Martin, Nicholas Muenks, and Aaron Nord.



In the December 2004 issue of "Choice: Current Reviews for Academic Libraries," **Dr. John Gresham,** Professor of Systematic Theology, Kenrick-Glennon Seminary /

Paul VI Institute, reviewed Internet sites for accessing the Vatican II Documents. Dr. Gresham had two more reviews published in the May issue of "Choice": World Christian Database (Internet Resource) and Christian Community in History volume one by Roger Haight. In addition to the courses Dr. Gresham taught for Kenrick-Glennon Seminary this past academic year, he also taught courses in Christology, Ecclesiology, and Johannine Literature for the St. Louis Archdiocese Permanent Diaconate program; Theological Research for the Permanent Diaconate program at Quincy University, Illinois; Catechism I: Catholic Doctrine for Paul VI Institute, and Ecclesiology for the Carmelite Sisters of the Divine Heart of Jesus.

Fr. Morris offered theological background and personal reflections before, during, and after the funeral of John Paul II as well as before and after the conclave that elected Pope Benedict XVI.

The Paul VI Institute was created in response to the Vatican II Council, and exists to form laity (though deacons and religious take classes as well) in the areas of faith and provide a uniform program of catechetical certification for those lay people teaching in Catholic elementary schools or Parish School of Religion programs. Dr. Gresham singles out Fr. Edward Richard, MS, with the assistance of Kenrick faculty member Fr. Donald Henke, as providing direction for the Paul VI Institute.

Kenrick faculty members also instruct those men (and their spouses) in the Permanent Diaconate program. Faculty involved in this endeavor include Dr. Gresham, Fr. Morris, Fr.

"One of my favorite books for spiritual reading is *Story of a Soul* by Saint Therese of Lisieux. This book gave me an introduction to the spiritual life, as well as fostering a devotion to now one of my favorite saints. Through a description of her struggles, Saint Therese makes herself tangible to the reader. Her 'Little Way' has taught me many lessons which have helped me in my seminary formation. I would recommend this book to anyone looking for a good beginning point in the spiritual life."

"I recommend *The Screwtape Letters* by C.S. Lewis. This classic work is a funny and imaginative peek into the correspondence between two devils, Screwtape to his nephew Wormwood. The wiser devil corrects his apprentice tempter on how to correctly steer souls off the path of the straight and narrow while at the same time preventing influences that could bring them back into the hands of the 'enemy.' Methods of temptation change and progress like everything else and need to be constantly updated to continue to be effectively seductive. This work is an excellent illustration of how the devil thinks and operates, presenting many situations to which one can easily relate and observe in modern society, helping us call to mind influences and decisions in our own lives that lead us away from God."

"The summertime is great for catching up on some of the less academic and formal spiritual writers. I am looking forward to reading Fulton Sheen's *The Priest Is Not His Own*, as well as rereading G.K. Chesterton's renowned *The Everlasting Man*. Chesterton will be a true pleasure, as he so capably articulates both what it is to be a well-reasoned Catholic in a non-Catholic world, as well as the great splendor of the Incarnation of Christ, all with his characteristic wit and nearly unparalleled grasp of the Catholic ethos. This summer will likewise be a great time to become more familiar with the writings of Benedict XVI."

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Walk With Archbishop Burke Inspires Seminarian

It was all I could think about on the bus...what am I going to say? What is he going to ask me? What

should I wear? (not really) Will he be as tired as I am? (really)

On January 24, 2005, while traveling back to St. Louis from Washington, D.C., where the seminary community

had participated in the annual March for Life, some of these questions popped into my mind as I nervously anticipated my walk with Archbishop Raymond L. Burke the following day, sounding to myself like an anxious high-schooler waiting for a prom date. Archbishop Burke has made it a point to walk with each of his St. Louis seminarians in an effort to better know his future priests.

At 4:30 in the afternoon the next day, the kindly Sister who greeted me at the entrance to the Archbishop's residence and led me to the parlor immediately put me at ease. The biggest surprise

when the Archbishop walked into the room about five minutes later was his dress. Never had I seen him dressed in anything "simpler" than his cassock, mozzetta, and zucchetto outside of a liturgical function. Thus, when I saw him clad in a jacket, slacks, and a cap, I was quite taken aback. However, as always, his gentleness and peaceful confidence were more than reassuring. And so, our walk began...

We immediately began speaking about the March for Life, as it was fresh in our minds—the encouraging number of youth in attendance and the beauty of

the church (Holy Rosary Parish) in which the Archbishop had offered Holy Mass for St. Louis pilgrims on the morning of the march.

The topic of our conversation then moved to our respective families. The Archbishop spoke wistfully of the days of his youth, growing up in Wisconsin on a dairy farm with his large family. I told him about my older brothers and sisters who are grown and have moved away from home and about

my younger brother (whom the Archbishop had met on a retreat he had hosted for young men contemplating a call to the priesthood in mid-February at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary).

As we crossed a bridge in Forest Park, we noticed some geese strutting about on a frozen pond, and the Archbishop nonchalantly noted that such a scene is ripe for the busy camera of a fellow seminarian known to be a shutterbug. I was both amused and amazed at this statement—amused because it was true, and amazed because the Archbishop *remembered* such particulars about his seminarians.

Toward the end of our walk, I asked the Archbishop about his episcopal duties. Now, as a seminarian, I thought I had a grasp on the term "busy." However, this word assumed new meaning as the Archbishop spoke of the meetings, conferences, pastoral visits, and ceremonies that are part of his schedule, and I found myself feeling ever more grateful to have such a devoted servant of this Archdiocese.

As we strolled east on Lindell Boulevard, back to the Archbishop's residence, I could not help thinking to myself: here is a man who is known and respected by fellow clergy and lay people alike throughout the nation—perhaps, the world—a man whose courage in living the Gospel and promoting a culture of life has brought his face to many newspapers and television screens—who is walking next to me, sincerely interested in my family and my life as a seminarian!

Msgr. Kevin Vann Appointed Coadjutor Bishop of the Diocese of Fort Worth

Msgr. Kevin W. Vann of the Diocese of Springfield, Illinois, has been appointed Coadjutor Bishop-designate of the Diocese of Fort Worth, Texas, by Pope Benedict XVI. The announcement was made May 17 in Washington, D.C., by Archbishop Gabriel Montalvo, apostolic nuncio to the United States.

Msgr. Vann was ordained a priest from Kenrick Seminary in 1981 and looks forward to celebrating his twenty-fifth anniversary in his new role.

"It is an honor for me to be one of the first appointments of Pope Benedict XVI, whom I very much admire."

Bishop-designate Vann will assist Bishop Joseph P. De-

laney in the day to day affairs of the diocese following his ordination to the episcopate on July 13 in Arlington, Texas.

Regarding Kenrick Seminary, Msgr. Vann had this to say: "Professors like Sister Zoe [Glenski] and the Vincentians taught me about the charism of the Daughters of Char-
